INFLUENCE AND SUCCESS OF FSPAC CONTINUE TO GROW

As one of the founding members of the FSPAC board of directors and as the FSPAC president, I have seen a significant transformation within the fraternal community of our awareness and acknowledgement of the importance of us being involved in the governmental regulatory and legislative process. Nine years ago we began as a fledgling group of leaders, bound together with common interests and concerns converging upon D.C., to the present time as a more sophisticated and proven organization now one of the top 50 of 902 non-connected federal political action committees.

There are many reasons for this success: the wonderful financial support we've received from our donors, the leadership of our board of directors and finance committee members who collectively have helped build the FSPAC, the insight of our team at Patton Boggs, our lobbyist, our Fraternal Government Relation Coalition partners, and the many fraternity and sorority member groups who embrace the importance of our community influencing federal regulation and legislation.

Our fundraising goal of \$600,000 for the 2013-14 election cycle is indeed an aggressive challenge, especially coming off of our best year ever in the 2011-12 cycle. Our success can be closely tied to the extensive support that we receive from the North-American Interfraternity Conference and National Panhellenic Conference member groups who number 45 strong, with a total of 65 representatives serving in the FSPAC board

of directors and the finance committee members ranks.

We are convinced that we have a strong message and that the fraternal community continues to see the relevancy and the value of our legislative efforts.

The time is right for action on our signature legislation, the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act (CHIA):

- Comprehensive tax reform has been identified by the 113th Congress as a key issue, and we feel that this legislation is the premier vehicle for CHIA.
- CHIA continues to enjoy bipartisan support in Congress.
- College enrollment continues to increase and student housing is becoming an even bigger issue with an increased demand and insufficient supply of housing.
- Due to our efforts since 2004, we now have many supporters of CHIA who are in leadership positions in both the Senate and the House who will be our advocates on the legislation.

The key to a successful and sustaining lobbying effort for any organization is an awareness of donors or members who have relationships with the legislators both on the national and state levels of government. We fondly refer to these relationships as the grassroots. Over the years, we have indeed begun to collect information on these relationships as we were made aware. The

lack of a database of relationships is a serious barrier to our work when we are in need of a quick response to a legislative matter or to lobby for action on issues important to fraternal life.

We are pleased to announce a method to help us extract these important relationships. The RAPIndex has been commissioned to populate a database of the many relationships that exist. This tool provides a survey that will reveal connections between donors and members of members of Congress, state legislators, and university administrators. The information compiled will serve many different uses for our fraternal community. If you have received our e-mail, please take the survey! The FSPAC is committed to ensuring that we have an influence on issues and opportunities that impact fraternities and sororities. As donors, we know that you want your discretionary dollars to make an impact. Our past hard work has set the stage, and we are confident that we can continue to serve as an advocate for the fraternal community.

CHIA UPDATE

The Senate introduced CHIA (S.654) on March 22 with four sponsors: Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA/ΔΓ), and Senator Mike Enzi (R-WY/ΣΧ). House bill H.R. 1449 was introduced with Representative Pete Session (R-TX/ΠΚΑ) and Representative Marcia Fudge (D-OH/ΔΣΘ). We now have seven Senate sponsors and 51 House sponsors.



2011-12 ELECTION CYCLE MOST SUCCESSFUL FOR FSPAC

As 2013 begins, the state of the Fraternity and Sorority PAC (FSPAC) is very strong thanks to support from you and hundreds of others nationwide. As you will read in this newsletter, the 2011-12 election cycle was our most successful cycle ever in terms of fundraising, and we used those funds to great effect. Some items worth noting:

- We now have our largest board of directors with a first-ever majority of female directors.
- Six outstanding students were selected to serve one-year terms on the board.
- We saw an 80% winning percentage for the 100 candidates we supported in the 2012 election.
- The 113th Congress includes 145 fraternity and sorority members.
- Twelve Greeks won first-time House (9) or Senate (3) races with FSPAC assistance.
- Three NPC alumnae won their first House/Senate races with FSPAC assistance.

- Twenty-eight of 34 (82%) Democrats FSPAC supported this cycle won their elections.

- 10 of 11 (91%) in the Senate
- 18 of 23 (78%) in the House

- Fifty-two of 66 Republicans (79%) FSPAC supported this cycle won their elections.

- 5 of 12 (42%) in the Senate
- 47 of 54 (87%) in the House

The 2013-14 election cycle is a promising one for FSPAC. We will celebrate our 10th year of operation in 2014, and our mission to support Greeks running for Congress is as important as ever. Public confidence in Congress is at a historically low point as citizens grow frustrated with partisan-driven gridlock on the major issues confronting our nation. FSPAC thinks a Congress that has more fraternity and sorority members means more people who have the skills, standards, and values to make the tough decisions needed to preserve our democracy for

future generations. Among the issues before this Congress are items that will impact the quality of fraternity life in the future:

1. Preserving the value of charitable deductions.
2. Passing the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act to improve living conditions for students across the country.
3. Educating Congress about our efforts to fight hazing on campus.
4. Protecting the freedom of association and due process rights of students as Congress considers reauthorization of the Higher Education Act.

The FSPAC needs the resources to have our voice heard on these important issues over the next two years.

We thank you for your past support. Please join us in celebrating 10 years of FSPAC success by renewing your financial support in 2013 and 2014.

FSPAC Supports an Expanded Legislative Platform

The FSPAC continues to be an active partner with the North-American Interfraternity Conference and the National Panhellenic Conference in the Fraternal Government Relations Coalition. Formed in April 2011, the Coalition has been instrumental in building awareness of the importance of this community's efforts to have an impact upon the regulation and legislation at both national and state levels of government.

The mission of the Coalition is to build a permanent platform for an integrated federal government relations program supporting the objectives and needs of fraternal life. The key issues that have been identified by the Coalition are as follows:

- Preserving freedom of association
 - Student rights

- Maintaining Title IX rights
 - Single-sex organizations
- Preserving charitable deductibility
- Supporting essentials of student success and safety
 - Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act
 - Violence against women legislation
 - Hazing prevention
 - Mental health awareness
 - College affordability

The Coalition is united in building awareness among our members of the many issues challenging our community. With an engaged community, we will be better positioned to advocate for regulations and legislation that preserves and enhances fraternal life.

WHY I SUPPORT THE FSPAC Helen Gordon

I believe in the Greek experience.

Fraternities and sororities teach us about leadership, value of community, and hard work. My sorority served me well as a collegian and being a Greek continues to shape my life.

By financially and personally supporting FSPAC, I am seeing progress in attaining our mutual goal.

I am proud of the work of the FSPAC in building awareness around the issues important to our community. It is critical that we have bipartisan Congressional allies in order to achieve our purpose. I look forward to continued FSPAC successes.

Helen graduated from Purdue University and has served Delta Gamma in various roles. She spearheaded fundraising for the \$100,000 endowment for the Delta Gamma Lectureship in Values & Ethics for Purdue and was awarded Delta Gamma's Cable Award.

New Independent Expenditure Account Increases FSPAC Fundraising Abilities

Until recently, the FSPAC was limited to accepting \$5,000 contributions per person per year, could only make direct candidate contributions of \$5,000 per election, and could not accept corporate contributions. We have had many of the house corporations and other corporations express an interest in making a contribution to our efforts as they have come to understand and value the importance of our work on the Hill for the fraternal community. Unfortunately we were unable to accept these contributions.

A recent change in federal election law allows the FSPAC to operate a separate independent expenditure account (IEA) that can accept unlimited personal contributions and unlimited corporate contributions. The only limitation is that those funds may not be used to make direct contributions in support of a candidate. Some examples of where this money can be distributed:

- Indirect support of select Greek Senate and House candidates
- Indirect support of Greek Senate and House primary candidates
- Engage in direct grassroots advocacy campaigns
- Fund for events and operations

Now house corporations, businesses that market to the fraternal community, and other corporations can make a contribution to the FSPAC to support our advocacy of issues that are important to the community.

Federal law requires us to use our best efforts to collect and report the name, address, occupation, and name of employer of each individual whose contributions aggregate in excess of \$200 in a calendar year.

Contributions are not tax deductible for federal income tax purposes. The maximum an individual may contribute is \$5,000 per calendar year. Corporations and foreign nationals without green cards are prohibited from contributing.
